Q2. What drives you to run as a candidate in the local body elections? What do you hope to achieve?

I offer my skills, competencies, experience and connections to the people of Whakatāne should they chose to vote for me to represent their best interests.

I love my hometown and our district faces real challenges: steep rates pressures, infrastructure demands, and the need to plan for sustainable growth. This requires councillors that work cohesively, debate openly to dissect the issues and solutions, and acts responsibly on behalf of the whole community. I believe the old model of council just surviving on rates is no longer tenable, household rates in Whakatane are rising to 42% compounding over three years so consequently if we are to exert downward pressure on rates, we need to find new revenue streams. Whakatane needs retirement villages both assisted care and lifestyle because at the moment there is nowhere for our seniors to retire to and many have to leave the district to retirement homes in Tauranga and Papamoa. My third priority is a second bridge to alleviate traffic congestion on landing Road. Those are three main goals of mine however basically We are all in this together and that is what I stand for: collaboration, fairness, and a strong commitment to the people who call Whakatāne home.

Q3. How will you support the kiwifruit industry?

I am a Kiwi fruit afictionado, I sometimes work with Kiwi country speaking under the vines and Kiwi fruit tours with cruise ship passengers so I will continue to support the Kiwi fruit industry enthusiastically and help local Kiwi fruit growers wherever and whenever possible.

Q4. What will you do to support the development of seasonal worker housing, especially in rural areas?

Whakatane has a shortage of available housing and we need to expedite new builds with quick and sensible consents.
